Reg. 1400/2002: why?

- Past car-specific BERs (1985 and 1995) did not fully achieve their goal
 - > Only one type of distribution exists
 - > Competition between dealers of the same brand limited
 - ➤ Competition in the after-sales servicing not working properly
 - = No sufficient benefit for consumers
- General vertical BER not fitted for cars
 - Focuses more on inter-brand competition than intrabrand (car sector: intra-brand is fundammental)
 - > After-sale and dealer protection: specific to the car sector



Reg. 1400/2002: objectives

- Main underlying policy objectives deal with sales and after-sales:
 - > Preventing foreclosure of competing motor vehicle and part manufacturers
 - > Preventing foreclosure of innovative / alternative distributions channels for new cars and parts
 - > Strengthening competition between dealers of cars and parts (including cross-border sales)
 - Ensuring wider access to essential inputs for all independent after-sale operators (information, training, spare parts)



Reg. 1400/2002: main features

- Direct inspiration: Reg 2790/1999
- Regulation, no directive:
 - > Direct effect, no need for implementation measures
- No compulsory text for the car sector
 - > Sets rules to respect so that distribution contracts benefit from a presumption of legality under competition rules (safe haven)
- Everything which is not prohibited is permitted
- The BER has a limited life
 - > 1 October 2003: bulk of regulation became obligatory
 - > 31 may 2010: the text will expire



Reg. 1400/2002: main provisions

- Three types of clauses mix Reg 2790/1999/cars
 - General conditions (article 3)
 - Reg 2790/1999: 30% market share threshold
 - > Sector specific: arbitration
- Hardcore restrictions (article 4)
 - ➤ Reg 2790/1999: resale price maintenance
 - > Sector specific (not only): paralle trade between Member States
- Specific conditions (article 5)
 - **▶** Reg 2790/1999: non compete
 - > Sector specific: location clause



Regulation 1/2003 - Modernisation of EU procedure

- Decentralised enforcement system
 - Treatment of complaints within the European Competition Network (ECN)
- The ECN is a COMPETITION network
 - Contractual and civil law issues are still for national courts and arbitrators to resolve
